<u>Courtney O'Malley</u> is returning to the \$1.6 billion foundation as its president. She was a vice president there for 10 years until 2013 and more recently served as executive director of the Theodore J. Forstmann Charitable Trust.

She follows Florence Davis, who died in May. Davis had led the foundation in New York since 1999.

Legacy

Bob Barker, a television game-show host who personally gave millions to help animals, died on August 26 at age 99. Barker hosted *The Price Is Right* for 35 years. In 1994, he donated \$25 million to create the DJ&T Foundation, which offers financial support to clinics that spay and neuter pets. A veteran who trained as a fighter pilot for the U.S. Navy during the Korean War, Barker also gave \$5 million to the Sea Shepherd Conservation Society to buy a boat for its campaign to stop illegal whale poaching in the Antarctic. The boat, which was named for him in 2009, was retired last year.
